

LIFE-SAVING CARE

5,300+ first aid kits were provided to places of detention and essential services providers, such as energy and water facilities and educational institutions. **2,000+** people participated in trainings.

24 primary health-care facilities were supported to continue provision of health-care services with equipment, consumables and medicines, including in areas under effective control of the Russian Armed Forces in Donetsk region.

1,650 people received psychological support, including through our hotline. Information sessions were held for **4,490+ individuals**.

1,178 psychologists, medical staff and volunteers at health-care facilities and the Ukrainian Red Cross were trained on support to families of missing and attended sessions and trainings provided by the ICRC to help the helpers.

13 war-wounded kits were donated to frontline/referral hospitals and health-care facilities.

59 hospitals (13 regularly and 46 ad hoc), including those treating war-wounded patients close to the frontline and main referral hospitals, were supported in Donetsk, Dnipropetrovsk, Kharkiv, Kherson, Mykolaiv and Kyiv regions.

27 medical staff from 3 hospitals participated in a 3-day **Mass Casualty training** in Dnipro.

79 wheelchairs were provided to patients with disabilities in places of detention, hospitals, and primary health-care centers.

259 physiotherapists trained in management of amputation patients. Similar on-the-job trainings are conducted regularly for medical practitioners.

139,800+ insulin vials & cartridges, 600 syringe-pens, 270+ glucometers, and 80,000+ test strips were provided to support primary health-care centers, hospitals, and mobile health units.

BASIC NEEDS & CIVILIAN SAFETY

285,000+ food & hygiene parcels (174,000+ hygiene parcels & 111,000+ food parcels) have been provided to hospitals, communities, and education facilities to ensure minimum food security for **400,000+ people** in conflict-affected areas.

345,000+ people received a total of **UAH 2.6 billion** (CHF 67.8 million) in cash assistance to cover various needs, including as part of the collaboration with the Ministry of Social Policy since 2022.

25,000 blankets donated to communities, collective centers, medical facilities, and other social institutions.

40,500+ essential household items e.g. tarpaulins (3,700 4x6-meter sheets), 9,500 solar lamps, 1,250 kitchen sets, and 1,100 jerry cans, provided as quick fixes for communities, hospitals, and health-care facilities (at least 66,000 households).

247 Greenhouse systems (3x10 meters) & **136 open ground kits** were provided to help communities restore medium- to long-term food security through changing seasons.

1,900 tons of hard fuel & 3,277 stoves and heating panels were provided to community centers, hospitals, educational facilities and people residing near the frontline (at least 27,000 households), as well as 11 places of detention.

PRESERVING LIVES AND DIGNITY

19 forensic institutions supported with technical equipment and materials for their work on search, recovery and identification of human remains. **347 forensic practitioners** were trained in dignified treatment of the deceased.

5,000 detainees received winter clothes, blankets and other items such as eye glasses. Families of detainees and POWs were provided with support for loss of income.

32,000 marking signs & 33,500 wooden poles for marking and 2,000 kilometers of delimitation tape were donated to the State Emergency Service of Ukraine and other mine action structures that focused most work in areas contaminated with explosive ordnance. **31 national mine actors** were supported with equipment related to mine clearance activities.

2,160+ people improved their awareness of risks related to mines and explosive remnants of war through dissemination sessions.

350+ staff of national mine action actors and other relevant structures received advanced professional training.

530+ staff of the Armed & Police forces were given training on IHL, international human rights law, law enforcement operations, international standards of conduct of hostilities, protection of POWs, and work on the missing and detained. **2 IHL centres** opened in Universities of Internal Affairs relocated from Donetsk & Kharkiv.

5,938 tracing requests were collected; the fates of **1,859 sought persons** were established; **172 families of missing persons** received legal support. Family associations received financial and capacity building support.

ESSENTIAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND EMERGENCY HOUSING RESPONSE

3,585,600+ people have better access to safe drinking water with the provision of water supply and treatment equipment, chemicals, and repair materials to utilities providers and administrations in Mykolaiv, Kherson, Novovorontsovka, Zaporizhzhia, Donetsk, Sloviansk, Luhansk, Marhanets and Pokrovsk.

1,050+ cubic metres of timber provided to support reconstruction of damaged housing and places of detention.

47,000+ cement roofing sheets (1.7 x 1.1 meters) were donated to support affected communities including the Ukrainian Red Cross as well as places of detention.

61 generators & 45 motor pumps donated to ensure water supply and wastewater sewage via the water service utilities. **14 transformers** were donated to support restoration of power supply, including in areas affected by flooding from the destruction of the Nova Kakhovka dam.

SUPPORTING RED CROSS MOVEMENT PARTNERS

260,000+ parcels (120,000+ hygiene & 140,000+ food parcels) and **1 car** (electric) were donated to the URCS to support their efforts in improving the food security of affected people.

5 Starlinks were donated to the Ukrainian Red Cross to provide satellite internet access coverage to the branches located in conflict-affected areas and close to the frontline.

29 URCS mobile health units were supported to provide 51,300+ consultations for people residing in areas heavily impacted by the conflict and areas close to the frontline, as well as IDPs in Sumy, Kharkiv, Poltava, Kyiv, Ternopil, Khmelnytskyi and Dnipro regions.

90 psychologists received training on trauma-informed care via online training sessions co-organized with Swedish Red Cross.
