FACILITATING ACCESS TO HEALTH CARE

- 279,635 patients benefited from the Primary Health Care program in 29 clinics.
- 53,734 patients were treated within the Outpatient Therapeutic program.
- 20,712 consultations took place at the four ICRC supported hospitals Emergency rooms.
- 1,918 patients received care at the two stabilization centers in Baidoa and Kismayo.




Monitoring: A total of **262** beneficiaries receiving primary health care (PHC) services in ICRC supported SRCS clinics were contacted for post-assistance delivery monitoring. These patients had been referred to hospitals for medical emergencies and their transportation paid.

FACILITATING ACCESS TO CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION SERVICES





 41,300 residents and IDPs leaving in Ceel Waaq benefitted from hygiene promotion sessions and the donation of soaps and jerrycans from SRCS 70 volunteers.





HELPING TO IMPROVE LIVING CONDITIONS OF DETAINEES

• Facilitated the return to homes of 17 released detainees who have been held in link with the armed conflict that erupted in May 2018 between Puntland and Somaliland.

RESTORING FAMILY LINKS (RFL)

- Helped re-establish contact between family members with the support of the SRCS through the exchange of 71,368 Red Cross Messages (RCMs), the facilitation of 66,512 phone calls, tracing services that helped locate 243 individuals and the reading of 5,183 names in the "Missing Persons" radio program on BBC Somali.
- 788 phone calls facilitated within the migration programme implemented in Somaliland (Zeyla & Boroma)





PROVIDING EMERGENCY RELIEF AID AND RESTORING LIVELIHOODS

- 157,284 persons received cash payments to cover their immediate needs.
- Distributed food to over 45,078 people.
- Provided essential household kits items to more than 36,624 people.
- 8,862 people in 17 agro-cooperatives received tractors, planters, disc ploughs, seeds and fertilizers for the sorghum and maize seeds production.





- 1,752 persons in fishing communities of Bosaso and Kismayo coastal areas received boats, boat engines and fishing kits.
- 1,140 households in 5 coastal areas of Kismayo received beekeeping equipment, business skills training, cash grants and technical trainings on beekeeping.



- **696** persons benefitted from agro recovery grants.
- 3,828 persons received training and productive cash grants to improve their businesses.



Monitoring: A total of 67,839 beneficiaries registered for relief and livelihood programs including recipients of cash and of in kind assistance were verified.

SPREADING KNOWLEDGE OF AND PROMOTING HUMANITARIAN PRINCIPLES AND IHL

- Over 2,090 community leaders, women, youth, beneficiaries and SRCS volunteers were sensitized on the Fundamental Principles and informed of ICRC and SRCS activities and programs.
- Some 355 members of the Somali armed and security forces were briefed on humanitarian principles and IHL, as well as on ICRC and SRCS activities in the field.
