JANUARY - DECEMBER 2022



The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) in Somalia has been responding to the needs of people affected by conflict, violence and climate shocks for more than 40 years in partnership with the Somali Red Crescent Society (SRCS).

In 2022, millions of people in Somalia faced severe effects of the extreme drought. Water scarcity has affected people in many ways, leading to food insecurity, malnutrition and disease outbreaks. The increase in violence and conflict has further exacerbated the situation, especially in hard-to-reach areas where access to essential services was already difficult. The ICRC has stepped up its efforts to provide life-saving assistance to impacted communities, including those in the hard to reach, conflict-affected areas.



PROVIDING EMERGENCY RELIEF AID, RESTORING LIVELIHOODS AND BUILDING CAPACITIES AND RESILIENCE

- 1,054,356 persons received multipurpose cash grants in the framework of the drought response. Additionally, 51,504 of them assisted with partial EHI kits.
- 49,869 children under 5 years-old and 17,041 pregnant and/or lactating women received PlumpySup and Cereals support.
- 51,900 individuals in riverine communities assisted with agro recovery grants after receiving multipurpose cash grants. Among them **1,644** individuals received cash assistance and maize seeds.
- 1,290 individuals assisted with cash and received funds to purchase work tools.
- 122,658 individuals received sandbags distributed by the SRCS to protect against floods.
- 3,276 members of farmer cooperatives received agricultural inputs and trainings for staple seeds production.
- 24 Community Animal Health Workers benefited from refresher training in the framework of a livestock treatment campaign in Puntland.
- 123 SRCS Volunteers of the Targeted Suplementary Feeding Program (TSFP), with ICRC support, were trained in Integrated Managament of Acute Malnutrition (IMAM).
- 395 women heads of households were assisted with grants for small business.
- 870 individuals received beekeeping items and training.
- 900 individuals received fishing items and training.
- 2,815 detainees received Ramadhan food rations in 5 places of detention.
- 1,936 detainees in Mandhera, Garowe, Bossaso and Hargeisa prisons received mosquito nets, mattresses and blankets.



HEALTH - FACILITATING ACCESS TO HEALTH CARE IN COLLABORATION WITH THE SRCS

- 553,596 patients accessed Primary Health Care (PHC) services through 36 clinics.
- **28,110** patients were cared for within the Outpatient Therapeutic program (OTP).
- 6,428 consultations held at the Kismayo General Hospital, 2,095 at Keysaney Hospital, 7,733 at Medina Hospital and 10,931 at Baidoa Hospital.
- 5,490 patients were treated at Kismayo and Baidoa Stabilization Centers.
- 2,346 primary health care beneficiaries were referred to various hospitals within the regions for emergency or specialized care and their transportation paid.



RESPONDING TO OUTBREAK OF ACUTE WATER DIARRHEA

- 212,432 people attended 31,911 health promotion sessions conducted to prevent acute water diarrhea.
- 3,025 acute water diarrhea cases identified and referred for treatment to various Somali Red Crescent Society clinics within the affected areas.



PHYSICAL REHABILITATION PROGRAMME

- 7,037 people benefited from physical rehabilitation services. (2,850 Mogadishu, 1,473 Hargeisa, 2,714 Galkayo respectively)
- In Mogadishu: 247 prostheses, 731 orthoses, 558 walking aids and crutches, 60 wheelchairs and postural devices delivered. 6,350 physiotherapy sessions conducted.
- In Hargeisa; 160 prostheses, 207 orthoses, 85 walking aids and crutches, 46 wheelchairs and postural devices delivered. **6,151** physiotherapy sessions conducted.
- In Galkacyo; 95 prostheses, 519 orthoses,457 walking aids and crutches, 135 wheelchairs and postural devices delivered. **7,020** physiotherapy sessions conducted.















- More than 298 weapon-wounded patients treated as part of First Aid and Pre-Hospital Emergency Care services.
- 400 participants attended Community First Aid Training course (CFAT) in the regions of Lasanod, Borama, Kismayo, Baidoa, Walaweyn, Dhusamareeb and Garowe.
- A total of 1,606 participants including volunteer responder teams attended First Aid & Pre-Hospital and Emergency Care (PHEC) courses such as First Aid routine training and Community First Aid Training (CFAT).



FACILITATING ACCESS TO CLEAN WATER, SANITATION AND HEALTH/DETENTION **INFRASTRUCTURE SERVICES**

- 282,171 people accessed clean water from 65 water supply systems.
- 6,510 people in Guriel accessed clean drinking water. Hygiene promotion campaign implemented in 7 villages in Bardhere, Belet Xaawo, Dhobley, Kismayo, Baidoa, Marka and Jowhar.
- In Kismayo Hospital (450 beds) and Keysaney Hospital (110 beds), the reconstruction of the X-Ray machine room completed.
- In Medina hospital (250 beds), the works for the rehabilitation of the laundry block and the pathways connecting the different hospital units completed.
- 3 tents donated to the Beletweyn Hospital (102 beds) following the expolsion that partially ruined the hospital, to serve as the admission and consultation points.
- Training for Kismayo and Keysaney hospitals teams to perform basic repairs on critical equipment and improving the energy system held.
- Detainees' living conditions improved in 3 places of detention. In Hargaisa and Garowe the improvement included works on water supply, ventilation and structural improvement, whereas 1 new kitchen and bakery that serves 638 detaineees in Mandhera were completed.
- 3,858 detainees benefited from 2 distributions of hygiene items throughout the year. This distribution covered 11 places of
- 3 primary health-care facilities in Kismayo, Balcad and Guriel entirely reconstructed.
- 20 Puntland Water Development Agency (PWDA) borehole operators trained and provided with a set of tools for the daily operation and maintainance of boreholes.





- 40 people received cash assistance to help them recover from the consequences of conflict or violence.
- Multidisciplinary support including medical evacuations, first aid training, livelihood support and MEI projects implemented in Xudur region to reduce the exposure of the affected communities to security risks.
- 5 Health Care in Danger dissemination sessions conducted for staff from 3 hospitals and a primary healthcare clinic.



HELPING TO IMPROVE LIVING CONDITIONS AND TREATMENT OF DETAINEES

- The ICRC visited 10 places of detention with 3,770 detainees to assess their living conditions and treatment. 109 detainees monitored and visited individually.
- In the 10 places of detention visited, 159 family news messages were transmitted to families of detainees by phone and 9 foreign nationals were notified to their consular representations or UNHCR.
- Donations of leisure and sports items made to 2 places of detention.


































- Creation of prison hygiene committees and training on the improvement of hygiene conditions for 1,699 detainees were held
 in 3 places of detention.
- A fumigation campaign to improve the living conditions of 1,182 detainees were held in 2 places of detention.
- 3 detainees received treatment in specialized private clinics.
- Supporting treatment for detainees with severe and moderate acute malnutrition were provided in 2 places of detention.



PROTECTION OF FAMILY LINKS

- In partnership with the SRCS, **129,258** Red Crescent Messages were exchanged, **171,738** free phone calls were offered to separated families and **303** missing persons were located.
- 11 video teleconference calls were facilitated between families living in Somalia and 2 detainees abroad.



RISK MANAGAMENT UNIT - ENSURING ACCOUNTABILITY TO THE AFFECTED POPULATION Community Contact Centre (373):



- A total of 15,404 calls from affected people received and processed through the toll-free (373) line from various locations.
- 87% (13,384) of the calls were related to the ongoing ICRC drought response. People called mainly from Hiraan (1,296), Lower Juba (1,201), Bakool (980) and Bay (925) regions.
- 13% (2,020) of the calls were related to the Primary Health Care Program and were received mainly from Lower Shabelle (533), Middle Shabelle (282) and Hiraan (206).



COMMUNICATION - SPREADING KNOWLEDGE AND PROMOTING HUMANITARIAN PRINCIPLES AND IHL

- Over **31,405** community leaders, women, youth, beneficiaries and SRCS volunteers were sensitized on the Fundamental Principles and informed of ICRC and SRCS activities and programs.
- 1,017 members of the armed, security and police forces were instructed on international humanitarian law and principles.
