



ENSURING LIFE-SAVING CARE AND OTHER HEALTH SERVICES



166 medical facilities

were supported with medical equipment, drugs, instruments, PPE, medical materials and consumables.



26 infection prevention and control kits

were donated to hospitals and ambulatories for preventing patients and health workers from being harmed by avoidable infection.



198 kits

containing essential medicines, medical devices and materials for the treatment of war-wounded patients were delivered to hospitals and healthcare departments in 9 regions.



More than 17,000 first aid kits

were provided to communities, SESU*, the URCS* and other actors.



Some 200,000 people

with diabetes, hypertension, cardiac diseases and asthma continued their treatment with donations of medications for non-communicable diseases to medical facilities.



More than 129,700 vials of insulin,

2,317 glucometers and over 837,400 test stripes were provided for insulin-dependent patients for the diabetes mellitus continuum of care.



893 children and adults

seeking shelter or directly involved in traumatic events were provided with psychological support and attended sessions on stress management and self-care.



467 wounded and sick

were assisted with transportation, medical evacuation and prehospital emergency medical care by the ICRC ambulance teams in the Luhansk, Donetsk and Mykolaiv regions.



144 MHPSS practitioners

and community volunteers received training to provide basic psychological support to the affected population.



486 wheelchairs,

173 walking frames, 366 crutches, and other assistive devices were donated to medical centres and social institutions for adults and children with disabilities.

MEETING THE BASIC NEEDS



136,300 IDPs*

benefitted from donations of food and hygiene parcels to the IDP centres and URCS* distribution points.



Some 869,500 vulnerable people

residing in conflict-affected areas received 387,982 individual and family food parcels, as well as 358,411 hygiene kits, essential household items and appliances.



Over 332,000 persons

across Ukraine were supported with cash assistance as a result of direct registrations and within the tripartite Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Social Policy and URCS*.



355 families

received fuel for heating their houses during the winter period.



More than 70,800 food and hygiene parcels

were provided to people seeking shelter in IDP* centres and other communities.



Around 85 social institutions,

including specialized care facilities for adults and children with disabilities, were supported with donations of food and hygiene items, essential household items, as well as financial assistance to ensure continuity of care.

ESSENTIAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND EMERGENCY HOUSING RESPONSE



Up to 10,300,000 people

have access to safe drinking water with the provision of water treatment chemicals, equipment, and materials to 36 water boards in 13 regions.



Up to 1,313,000 people

will benefit from restored centralized heating with the ICRC assistance to heating providers in the Kyiv, Kharkiv, Mykolaiv and Chernihiv regions.



Over 1,155,000 l of potable water

along with water tanks were delivered to the communities, schools and healthcare facilities in the Donetsk region as an emergency response due to damaged water supply systems.



400 generators,

44 specialized vehicles (cranes, water tankers), 25 excavators, 16 mobile water treatment units, water pumps, emergency construction materials and tools were donated to communities, the SESU*, and utility companies to respond in emergencies, facilitate the removal of construction debris, and carry out repairs to damaged infrastructure facilities.



Some 180,000 people

benefit from assistance for restoring power supply in the Mykolaiv region.



Over 4,600 damaged civilian homes









will be repaired thanks to the provision of cash assistance, materials and tools.












Some 33,800 families

received emergency construction materials and tools for the temporary rehabilitation of houses damaged as a result of hostilities.

PRESERVING THE LIVES AND DIGNITY

-  **New tracing cases**
are constantly opened in Ukraine with the ICRC and URCS* upon inquiry of families searching for their loved ones.
-  **More than 3,000 communications**
between separated family members (e.g. Red Cross messages, letters) were transmitted or facilitated by ICRC as a neutral intermediary.
-  **327 vulnerable families**
of the missing and families of persons deprived of their liberty were supported with cash assistance.
-  **Some 1,300 civilians and families**
whose relatives got injured or passed away due to the conflict, received cash assistance or funeral reimbursement.
-  **15 forensic structures and relevant regional authorities**
were provided with material assistance for the dignified treatment of the dead.
-  **277 officers from SESU***
attended specialized trainings on humanitarian mine action and blast trauma care. Protective items and First Aid kits were donated for SESU* officers responding to emergency situations to help them respond and work safely.
-  **Over 30,000 warning signs**
and 5,000 rolls of marking tape, as well as over 100 billboards were donated to the local structures for marking hazardous areas.
-  **Over 2,200 people**
improved their awareness of risks related to the danger of mines and explosive remnants of war through dissemination sessions.

SUPPORTING AND COORDINATING WITH MOVEMENT PARTNERS

-  **111 people with disabilities,**
as well as senior people with limited mobility, were assisted with transportation and medical evacuation from the Odesa and Mykolaiv regions to Moldova by the ICRC team with the support of the URCS*.
-  **8 mobile health units**
provided more than 4,300 consultations for people residing in remote areas heavily impacted by the conflict in the Kyiv, Sumy, Kharkiv, and Poltava regions within the joint healthcare service project of the URCS*, local authorities, and ICRC.
-  **Identification materials**
and ICT equipment were donated to support the operation of the URCS* field branches.
-  **6 URCS* branches**
in the Odesa region were supported with the rental of warehouses for setting distribution points.
-  **62 field hospital modules,**
medical equipment, furniture and devices were delivered to healthcare facilities in the Donetsk, Dnipro, Kyiv, Chernihiv and Zaporizhzhia regions from Finnish, Canadian, Norwegian, and German Red Cross societies with the support of the ICRC.
-  **175 people**
attended First Aid training conducted in cooperation with the URCS*.
-  **Over 125,600 food parcels**
were delivered to the URCS* as part of the mobilization support to improve the food consumption of affected people for one month along with the donation of some 69,700 hygiene kits.
-  **ICRC vehicles**
were donated to the URCS* branches to enhance their response capacity in emergency situations. One tented truck was donated to the URCS* in Kharkiv to support their humanitarian operations in the area.
-  **URCS* volunteers**
were actively involved in distributions of humanitarian assistance to the affected communities across the country, registration of vulnerable population for receiving financial assistance and monitoring outcomes of provided support, evacuation of vulnerable people, dissemination sessions on mine risk awareness in the hazardous areas.
