

ENSURING LIFE-SAVING CARE AND OTHER HEALTH SERVICES



170 medical facilities were supported with medical equipment, drugs, instruments, PPE, medical materials and consumables.



85 War-wounded kits/sets with essential medicines, medical devices and materials for the treatment of some 4,250 war-wounded patients were delivered to hospitals and healthcare departments.



103,000 people continued their treatment with donations of non-communicable diseases (diabetes, hypertension, cardiac diseases, asthma) medications to medical facilities.



1,528 children and adults seeking shelter or directly involved in traumatic events were provided with psychological support and attended sessions on stress management and self-care.



177 MHPSS practitioners and community volunteers received training to provide basic psychological support to the affected population.



26 infection prevention and control kits were donated to hospitals and ambulatories for preventing patients and health workers from being harmed by avoidable infection.



17,200+ first aid kits were provided to communities, State Emergency Service of Ukraine (SESU), the Ukrainian Red Cross Society (URCS), and other actors.



268,000+ vials & cartridges of insulin, 2,754 glucometers and over 856,600 test strips were provided for insulin-dependent patients for the diabetes mellitus continuum of care.



708 wounded and sick were assisted with transportation, medical evacuation and prehospital emergency medical care by the ICRC ambulance teams in the Luhansk, Donetsk, Odesa and Mykolaiv regions.



728 people benefitted from donations of wheelchairs, walking frames, and other assistive devices to medical centres and social institutions for adults and children with disabilities.

BASIC NEEDS



160,000+ IDPs benefitted from donations of food and hygiene parcels, household appliances and essential items to the IDP centres and URCS distribution points.



346,000+ people across Ukraine were supported with cash assistance totaling over **UAH 4.5 billion** (CHF 112 million) as a result of direct registrations and within the tripartite Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Social Policy and the URCS.



668 heaters & over 57,940 blankets were donated to communities, collective centres and medical facilities.



19,600+ tonnes of hard fuel were provided for over 24,196 people in heavily impacted areas of the Donetsk, Kherson, and Luhansk regions to help them cope with harsh temperatures during the winter period.



894,900+ vulnerable people residing in conflict-affected areas received 509,686 individual and family food parcels, as well as 506,410 hygiene kits, essential household items and appliances.



UAH 545 million (CHF 14 million) of cash assistance was provided to 57,754 people to improve their living conditions during the winter season and purchase animal fodder.



3,000+ people with limited mobility residing in the Luhansk region were supported with donations of bedridden kits and hygiene items.



425 social institutions, including specialized care facilities for adults and children with disabilities, IDP centres, heating points and local administrations, were supported with food and hygiene items, household items, water boilers, heaters and financial assistance to ensure continuity of care.

ESSENTIAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND EMERGENCY HOUSING RESPONSE



10,600,000+ people have access to safe drinking water with the provision of water treatment chemicals, equipment, and repair materials to 46 water boards and 7 administrations in 13 regions impacted by the armed conflict on both sides.



1,510,800+ litres of potable water along with 1,235 water tanks were delivered to the communities, schools and healthcare and educational facilities as an emergency response due to damaged water supply systems.



250,000 people benefit from assistance for restoring power supply in the Kherson, Kharkiv, and Mykolaiv region; over 23,600 people living close to the frontlines and recently retaken locations in the Kharkiv region were supported with cash assistance to prepare for the winter period.



24,600+ people in the Mykolaiv, Kherson, Kharkiv, Donetsk, and Chernihiv regions gained access to improved or rehabilitated medical services to damaged hospitals and primary healthcare facilities.



~1,400,000 people benefit from restored centralized heating with the ongoing assistance to heating providers in the Kherson, Donetsk, Chernihiv, Kharkiv, Mykolaiv and Kyiv regions.



Over 550 generators, 75 electrical transformers, 64 specialized vehicles (cranes, water tankers), 27 excavators, 33 water treatment units, 100+ water pumps, emergency construction materials and tools were donated to utility companies, emergency services, local authorities and communities to respond in emergencies, facilitate the removal of debris, and carry out repairs to infrastructure facilities.



Over 55,000 damaged civilian homes received cash and materials support to repair their houses.



125 schools, kindergartens and forensics service institutions were supported with rehabilitation, donations of generators, materials for repairs, and potable water.

Operational Highlights: Ukraine 24 February – 31 December 2022

PRESERVING LIVES AND DIGNITY

 Shared information with families on **3,250+ sought persons** and persons deprived of their liberty; family news have been shared through Safe and Well Red Cross messages to 650+ persons deprived of their liberty.

 **3,400 letters exchanged** between Ukrainian PoW held in the Russian Federation and their families (through the two National Information Bureaus via the ICRC Central Tracing Agency).

 Seeking to clarify **fate & whereabouts of 6,400+ people** upon the request of families; we are following 22,600+ missing persons, persons deprived of their liberty and their families.

 **411 vulnerable families** of the missing and families of persons deprived of their liberty were supported with cash assistance.

 **Some 1,800 civilians and families** whose relatives sustained injury or passed away due to the international armed conflict, received cash assistance or funeral reimbursement.

NFI 18 forensic structures & regional authorities were provided with material assistance for the dignified treatment of the dead.

 **302 officers from SESU** attended specialized training programmes (blast trauma care, explosive ordnance reconnaissance etc). Protective items and First Aid kits were donated for SESU officers responding to emergency situations to help them respond and work safely.

 **Over 38,900 warning signs** and 6,112 rolls of marking tape were donated to the local structures for marking hazardous areas.

 **Some 16,190 people** improved their awareness of risks related to the danger of mines and explosive remnants of war through dissemination sessions.

 **47 officers** of penitentiary institutions participated in ICRC sessions on the treatment of POWs; **781 officers** of the Ukrainian military and police forces reached from 31 sessions on international humanitarian law and international human rights laws.

SUPPORTING AND COORDINATING WITH MOVEMENT PARTNERS

 **196 people with disabilities**, as well as senior people with limited mobility, were assisted with transportation and medical evacuation from the Odesa and Mykolaiv regions to Moldova by the ICRC team with the support of the URCS.

 **29 mobile health units** provided 78,600+ consultations for people residing in remote areas heavily impacted by the conflict in the Kyiv, Sumy, Kharkiv, and Poltava regions within the joint health-care service project of the URCS, local authorities, and ICRC.

 **UAH 425 million** (CHF 11 million) was contributed by the ICRC to strengthen the operational capacity and development of the URCS, supporting local branches and volunteers on the frontline.

 **UAH 80 million** (CHF 2 million) was transferred to the URCS to assist 59,980 people in retaken areas of the Kharkiv region and Kherson city under a joint cash assistance project with the URCS and Ukrposhta.

 **62 field hospital modules**, medical equipment, furniture and devices were delivered to healthcare facilities in the Donetsk, Dnipro, Kyiv, Chernihiv and Zaporizhzhia regions from Finnish, Canadian, Norwegian, and German Red Cross societies with the support of the ICRC.

 **811 people** attended the First Aid training conducted in cooperation with the URCS.

 **185,000+ food parcels** were donated to the URCS to support their efforts in improving the food security of affected people for one month along with the donation of some 283,000 hygiene kits.

 **38 vehicles**, including ambulances, were donated to the URCS branches to enhance their response capacity in emergency situations.

 **2,294 URCS volunteers** were actively involved in distributions of humanitarian assistance to the affected communities across the country, registration of vulnerable population for receiving financial assistance and monitoring outcomes of provided support, evacuation of vulnerable people, dissemination sessions on mine risk awareness in hazardous areas.

 **112 URCS volunteers** attended 13 trainings on risk awareness related to the danger of mines, unexploded ordnance, shooting, and shelling for further independent dissemination among the population.
